## Big Fun with Little Ones

South Lake Union isn't just for grown-ups.

Despite the business-centric vibe of busy SLU, the neighborhood is actually quite kid-friendly. The South Lake Union Streetcar is a fun adventure on its own, and it accesses plenty of points of interest along the way.

Pack a picnic and head to **Lake Union Park** ([atlakeunionpark.org](http://atlakeunionpark.org)) for some outdoor time. The spraypark, open during summer, is a perfect way to find relief on a hot Seattle day. Nearby, **The Center for Wooden Boat's** ([cwb.org](http://cwb.org)) model-boat pond attracts little (and grown-up) boat enthusiasts through September. A suggested \$5 donation lets parents rent a 39-inch pond boat (a replica of the R-boat *Pirate*, which is on display at South Lake Union) as a fun way for kiddos to learn the basics of sailing without getting on the water. The Center also offers numerous youth camps and classes that cover woodworking, sailing, and boat designing throughout the summer.

For water-loving families, **Moss Bay** ([mossbay.co](http://mossbay.co)), located at the southeastern corner of the lake, rents out kayaks and stand-up paddleboards. The outfitter puts on a string of summer kayak and SUP camps from June through August, too. These are sold out for 2017, but a wait-list is available.

**Playdate Seattle** ([playdatesea.com](http://playdatesea.com)) on Mercer Street is an 8,000-square-foot indoor playground that features a separate toddler area and a main play space for kids up to age 12. Regular events include weekly puppet shows and laser tag on Saturday nights. This kid-friendly space has an attached café for parents, too.

Admission is free for parents, \$8 for toddlers age 3 and younger, and \$12 for kids age 4 and older. Playdate Seattle's Players Club Summer Camps are \$285 per child each week and include meals, crafts, snacks, and more. —**Ethan Chung**
